Intelligence Finally Admits that Iran is Fighting the US in Iraq

Iran's policy of pursuing "managed chaos" in Iraq is mainly conducted by the Revolutionary Guards' Quds (Jerusalem) Force, the Iranian military's foreign arm, which also supports the Shia Hezbollah in Lebanon and the Sunni Hamas in the Palestinian territories.

Shia and Sunni armed factions have, for months, been fighting a vicious internecine conflict, murdering thousands of civilians. But the top Iranian Quds commander arrested recently (known by the alias Chizari) was carrying documents that showed links with both sides. One US officer reported: "We found plans for attacks, phone numbers affiliated with Sunni bad guys, a lot of things that filled in the blanks on what these guys are up to."

One captured Iranian document contained a Quds assessment of the Iraqi conflict throws fresh light on the growing battle between Iran and Saudi Arabia for influence in the region. It said that because Iraq's Sunni neighbors, including Saudi Arabia, were likely to intensify their support for Sunni terrorists in Iraq, Iran should also step up its aid to those groups.

Iran has set up a network of fake import-export companies in Iraq's Anbar province to channel funds to Sunni terrorists. At secret meetings, tribal sheikhs with close ties to the terrorists revealed details of the money-laundering to Michael Rubin, a former Pentagon official and political adviser to the Coalition Provisional Authority. "Truckloads of Iranian appliances like televisions are shipped into Iraq, apparently legitimately, and then sold for cash that can be channeled to Sunni terrorists," said Mr. Rubin, now at the American Enterprise Institute think-tank. "The Iranians are very pragmatic about who they will deal with."

The underlying assumption of those like the leftist Iraq Study Group, who back talks with Teheran, is that a stable Iraq is somehow in Iran's interests. But that's not so. Iran does not want a new Somalia on its borders, but nor does it want to live next to Switzerland. They are happy with managed chaos. They view American

realistically. They accurately perceive America as a weak and incompetent nation that will cave in during any protracted war. The Iranians look forward to the day when they can use nuclear blackmail against the US, and will thereby reduce the US to the status of an Islamic puppet-state. They are already using the threat of nuclear bomb development as a bargaining chip, which has already accrued to the Iranians billions of US taxpayer money and under the table appeasement payoffs.

Iran has worked with al-Qa'eda groups responsible for some of the worst atrocities against Iraqi Shias, including the attack on the Golden Mosque in Samarra last February.

Alireza Jafarzadeh, the Iranian exile leader who first revealed Teheran's secret nuclear program to the world, has compiled a dossier detailing the vast network run by Quds in Iraq. (QuikManeuvers.com offered the first American publication to give evidence of the fact that many combatants fighting America in Iraq are Iranians.) Its operations are centered on Basra and Najaf, and use a series of supposed religious and cultural organizations as well as diplomatic consulates across the country to develop, fund, and arm militia and rebel groups.

Thousands of Shia militiamen have reportedly traveled to Iran for training and indoctrination, while Quds sends millions of dollars cash in the other direction each month, through diplomatic pouches and border crossings it controls. British and American officials have also identified Iran as the source of the materials and manufacture of a new, more lethal variety of roadside bomb that has claimed coalition lives.

New information from sources in Iran further confirms that Iran's Revolutionary Guards Corps and its notorious Quds Force are the biggest threats inside Iraq and have been since 2004. "Unless Iran's influence is curbed, its agents arrested and brought to justice and its proxies exposed, a genuine national unity government cannot take shape in Iraq." However, the controlling American left considers itself an ally of totalitarian Iran.

In a sign of Iran's influence at the highest levels in Baghdad, the Quds Force commander captured by US forces was released. He was said to have diplomatic immunity in spite of the fact that he is a bloody-handed terrorist.
