



What is the Typical CIA Officer Like?

The typical CIA officer was brought up in a nice American suburb during the 1960s or 1970s and graduated rarely in the top half of his class from a typical American college in the 1970s and 1980s and 1990s.

In college, he was conditioned to believe a litany of neo-Marxist frauds and historical misunderstanding. He was taught by a group of leftist professors (comprising 90% or more of every American college and university) who succeeded in embedding in his brain a number of outrageous leftist biases including a strong distaste for white middle class Americans whom he regards as provincial, unsophisticated, reactionary, religious, and lacking in good taste about the finer things in life. Hard working American taxpayers are considered by leftists to be red necks worthy only of suppression. However, they are positively ga-ga over black Americans and strongly black racists. In their world, there are no Hispanics, American Indians or Orientals; there are only blacks, who must always be awarded suzerainty over white "red necks."

Such tyrannical and evil attitudes as anti-white racism, political correctness and multi-diversity are as pervasive among US college professor's as is their sympathy for communism and muslim imperialism. In fact, the enemy of the American working man is their friend. It is impossible to understand the American college professor and the CIA without realizing that many of them consider themselves the under appreciated "best and brightest" of the earth, or at least of the United States. They think that they are the people to whom the powerful just have to listen. They think that they should be a feudal elite, serving as tyrants over millions of white workers forced to

toil 60-80 hours a week paying the most burdensome of taxes, much of which would be used to support minority parasites.

The average CIA intelligence, research and/or administrative employee has never done manual labor, and has never been personally close to anyone who has lived by it. He has never had to struggle for his next meal, and has never known anyone who has. He has no idea of life under arbitrary power. He has never served in the armed forces, much less has he known danger. He has traveled abroad as a tourist, but has never lived or transacted business abroad. His upbringing did not acquaint him with passion of any kind. It taught him to distrust the notion that anyone can believe in anything. He does not attend church or synagogue, nor does he argue about religion. However, he and his fellows are strongly oriented towards pro-muslim and anti-semitic feelings. He is an unpleasant fellow, neither aggressively patriotic nor aggressively anything, and is uncomfortable with anyone who is. His education did not make him an expert in any field, such as chemistry or computers. But his lack of technical training does not mean that he has a classical education, either. He does not know the history, the language, or the politics of any part of the world. Nor does he know a line of business, like cars, or printing, or garment manufacturing. He is not independently wealthy. He has been an employee of the CIA, and has been around the State Department. This case officer, who is much less potent than his postwar predecessors, has a much tougher row to hoe than they did.

This case officer will have a hard time meeting and getting along with his potential source. Not only can he not, say, live as a mechanic in Runtania and get a job fixing cars for the secretaries of a hypothetical foreign military mission. (His forebears couldn't either, but they didn't have to.) He is unlikely even to be able to recruit a mechanic to act as his source, because he is unlikely ever to have had a meaningful conversation with any mechanic. He literally does not speak that language. If he tries to frequent places where mechanics congregate, he is sure to stick out like a sore thumb, much as John Kerry in the 2004 electoral campaign inadvertently pointed to his patrician upbringing via a maladroit imitation of the average American. For precisely the same reasons, this case officer cannot expect to "get in" among scientists, or professional politicians, or soldiers, or stockbrokers, or priests. If by luck he manages to enter such circles, he is not likely to understand what he sees. After all, while a scientist is attuned to the vagaries of the world of science and can instantly recognize the types of people there (the passionate risk-takers, the bean-counters, the entrepreneurs, the careerists, etc.), all its inhabitants will look alike to this case officer. As an unspecialized bureaucrat, this case officer will be able to get to first base only with unspecialized bureaucrats.

Consider also his cultural limitations. There are a few people in America who have passed themselves off as Muslims, and literally risked their heads on their knowledge of Arabic and Islam by going on the pilgrimage to Mecca, the *Hadj*. There are many more Americans who can blend into Mexico, and even some who can talk shop with Chinese farmers. But such people don't get hired by the CIA. Spanish is the mother tongue of perhaps 25 million Americans. Yet the CIA has been unable (read *unwilling*) even to staff its Mexico City station with people who speak Spanish - never mind people who speak and have a "feel" for the Spanish of Mexico City secretaries. The same goes for any other field in any other nation. Serbian physicians, Thai soldiers, Japanese athletes - each group speaks its own language. But none of these languages are spoken at or by the CIA.

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
